DATASET CHANGE NOTICE (2007) 06 (W)

Reference: WIGSB 20070315001

Subject: Amendment to Data Items 'Patients Usual Address', 'Postcode of Usual Address' and 'Birth Date'

Reason for Change: To revise the definition of Patients Usual Address and Postcode and to introduce a new value for Unknown Date of Birth.

Effective Date: Immediately

Background:

The changes outlined in this DSCN are a result of the Secondary Care Information Steering Group (SCISG).

Unknown Date of Birth

The Secondary Care Information Steering Group questioned the recording of an unknown date of birth and how Health Solutions Wales (HSW) process this via Validation at Source (VAS) and how this date is held on the national databases.

As part of the Outpatient Data Quality Project; the value '00000000' was added to the NHS Wales Data Dictionary for an Unknown Date of Birth. This change was approved in DSCN (2006) 04 (W). Since implementation, there has been much discussion as to whether certain Trusts can hold this on their PAS and have stated they would prefer to submit '11111111'. However, this will be held as an invalid date on the National Databases. This is because dates in SQL have to be in a particular date range to be understood by the application. The year must be greater than "1753" to be recognised in SQL as a date otherwise the date is set to null.

HSW subsequently proposed the value 11/11/1811 for an unknown date of birth. This was discussed with Trust representatives and other group members at SCISG. It was agreed that Trusts would submit the proposed value '11/11/1811' when they did not know the actual Date of Birth of the patient.

It was also noted that the value of unknown date of birth is included in the definition for the data item 'Date Format'. This will be removed as it relates to a date value and not a date format.

Patients Usual Address & Postcode of Usual Address

The second change included in this DSCN came from a paper also presented at SCISG that related to Demographical Changes. A query was raised asking whether the patients address is recorded at the time of admission or at the time of discharge. An additional sentence will be added to the definition of 'Patients Usual Address' and 'Postcode of Usual Address' to state that the address recorded is the address at the time of admission or attendance. This is needed to facilitate demographic analysis for specific clinical conditions.

Patient's Usual Address (APC ds99/ EAL mds/ OP mds/ CC mds)

This is the usual address nominated by the patient **at the time of admission or attendance.** If patients usually resident elsewhere are staying in hotels, hostels or other residential establishments for a short term, say a week, they should be recorded as staying at their usual place of residence. However if long term, such as at boarding school, the school address must be recorded. University students may nominate either their home address or the address of their university accommodation. Where patients are not capable of supplying this information, because of age or mental illness, for example, then the person responsible for the patient, such as a parent or guardian, should nominate the usual address. Patients not able to provide an address should be asked for their most recent address. If this cannot be established then you should record the address as `No fixed abode' or `Address unknown'. These patients are regarded as resident in the local geographical district for contracting purposes. For birth episodes this should refer to the mother's usual place of residence.

APC, EAL and OP mds Format: 175 character alpha-numeric. This is based on 5 lines of 35 characters. This relates to the physical layout of the address, not the logical layout and does not require intelligent intervention when splitting the text string into lines.

Prior to April 1999 the PEDW Format: 100 character alpha-numeric. This is based on 4 lines of 25 characters. This relates to the physical layout of the address, not the logical layout.

Postcode of Usual Address

(APC ds99/ EAL mds/ OP mds/ CC mds)

The postcode applied to the usual address nominated by the patient **at the time of admission or attendance**, using rules supplied under the data item POSTCODE and those in the NHS Postcode User Directory.

Format: 8 character alpha-numeric. This allows a space to be inserted to differentiate between the inward and outward segments of the code, enabling full use to be made of the Royal Mail postcode functionality.

NACS rules apply.

If a patient has no fixed abode, this should be recorded with the appropriate code (ZZ99 3VZ).

For overseas visitors, the postcode field must show the relevant country pseudo postcode commencing ZZ99, plus spaces followed by a numeric, then an alpha character, then a Z. For example, ZZ99 6CZ is the pseudo-postcode for India. Pseudo-postcodes can be found in the NHS Postcode Directory. They can also be found in the Organisation Codes service Handbook, Appendix F. NACS rules apply.

If a patient has no fixed abode, this should be recorded with the appropriate code (ZZ99 3VZ).

For overseas visitors, the postcode field must show the relevant country pseudo postcode commencing ZZ99, plus spaces followed by a numeric, then an alpha character, then a Z. For example, ZZ99 6CZ is the pseudo-postcode for India. Pseudo-postcodes can be found in the NHS Postcode Directory. They can also be found in the Organisation Codes service Handbook, Appendix F.
